
History

Scouting for boys (Boy Scouts) was founded by Lord Robert Baden-Powell in England in 1907. Due to the persistent attendance of girls at Boy Scout meetings, Robert solicited the assistance of his sister. Agnes and later, his wife Olave to begin the sister organization of Girl Guides. Hence in 1910, Guiding was started in England.

Scouting and Guiding quickly spread throughout the British Commonwealth. Guiding was introduced to the Bahamas in 1915 by Lady Allardyce, wife of the Governor and Ms. Lobb.

Unfortunately, due to the lack of leaders, Guiding was discontinued in 1933. However, in 1946 Guiding was reintroduced and the three sections (Brownies, Guides and Rangers) were activated under the guidance of the first Island Commissioner Mrs. Eulalie Kelly.

In 1975, the Bahamas Girl Guides Association became an Associate Member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts and qualified to become a Full Member in September 1978. In the same year an act to incorporate the Bahamas Girl Guides Association was enacted by Parliament.



Bahamas Girl Guides Association's membership is composed of girls and young women, as well as adult female leaders (guiders) and volunteer members of the community. The organization is all about the positive development of girls by providing opportunities for girls and women to explore their creativity, spirituality and gifts, as they develop.

The aim of The Bahamas Girl Guides Association is to provide a programme embracing a wide range of leisure-time activities and interests which, while enjoyable in themselves, have an underlying educational purpose, namely, to develop individual character based on the values expressed in the Promise and Law. Through this programme, the Association promotes young women in decisionmaking.


